

# Senator Thyse Gives Short Address Here

### Five Republican Candidates On State Level Tour County

Five Republican candidates on the state level converged on Otter Tail county yesterday, and met many voters at various points.

After having breakfast at Parkers Prairie, U.S. Senator Edward J. Thyse, Gaylord A. Saetre, candidate for attorney general, and L. C. (Andy) Andersen, candidate for secretary of state, made stops at Henning, Daulte Lake and this city. They also visited the Merle Loomer farm in Western township before leaving for Breckenridge and Moorhead.

Val Djornson, candidate for reelection as state treasurer, and Arthur H. Ogle, candidate for lieutenant governor, called at Deer Creek, New York Mills, Perham and Pelican Rapids.

The five candidates met at Moorhead for an evening meeting last night. They plan to visit a large number of points in the Ninth district before returning to St. Paul.

### THYSE SPEAKS HERE

In a brief talk at the River Inn here at noon, Senator Thyse said that the opposition had falsely accused him of having voted against a bill aimed to help small business men. He said he had voted against an amendment to the bill that he and others had deemed detrimental.

### GOOD LAWS FOR SMALL BUSINESS

Thyse asserted that no legislative session has been as beneficial to this nation's four million small businessmen as the second session of the 85th Congress. Under the strong leadership of President Eisenhower most of the administration's small business program was enacted into law in spite of the opposition to much of that program by the Democratic leaders in Congress.

"As ranking minority member and former chairman of the Senate Small Business Committee, I was privileged to head the administration forces in the Congress, and I am especially pleased that we were able to deliver on the many promises which have been made to the small business community in the past," said Thyse.

### AUTHOR OF BILL

Senator Thyse outlined three major pieces of small business legislation passed at the last session of Congress. "First and foremost, the Small Business Act of 1958 gave expanded authority and duties to the Small Business Administration, and with the adoption of the Thyse amendment in the senate, the SBA was made a permanent agency. This assures all small and independent business that there will always be at least one department of government sympathetic to their needs, the speaker said. Senator Thyse was the author of the Small Business Act of 1953, which originally set up the Small Business Administration.

The speaker also pointed out that the Small Business Tax Revision Act of 1958 was an important piece of tax reform, and one that will grant meaningful relief to all business.

The third piece of legislation set up a department within the SBA to administer a new equity financing facility for small business. These capital banks are intended to fill the credit gap which independent business has always had to surmount in order to obtain long-range financing.

Robt. Allison was chairman, and thanked the visitors for their tour through the county.

# Former Becker Woman Killed

### Accidental Shooting In Oregon Was Reported Earlier In Journal

Mrs. Carl Helen Frances Fredrickson, 47, Minneapolis, who was reported accidentally shot to death Friday while riding in a car with relatives near Bend, Ore., was a sister of Carl Wokasch of Evergreen township, across the Otter Tail county line in Becker county.

As will be remembered she was riding back to Bend after a visit with a son at San Diego.

She had gone west to visit a son Roger, 17, stationed in San Diego, and then went north to visit two sisters. She was on her way to visit one of her sisters, when the fatal shooting occurred. A suspect, Myron Barkley of Chiloquin, Ore., admitted killing his half brother in an early morning fracas, the homicide having taken place in the same area where Mrs. Fredrickson was killed by a stray bullet. She was a daughter of the late John Wokasch, and her brother, Carl, still lives on the home farm in Becker county.

# Parents Ask Smaller First Grade Class

### Adams School Has 41 Pupils In First Grade Room

Fifty parents from Adams school district appeared at the school board meeting to object to the fact that one teacher is required to teach 41 first graders.

Most parents felt the solution is an additional teacher since the boundary is only a block east of the Adams school now.

The school board deferred action until an adjourned meeting Monday evening. Supt. I. E. Wermager said a few years ago there were 45 in one first grade in the city and no parents objected.

The board approved adding a tract of land north of the highway near Hoot lake to the Fergus Falls district. The request was made by the Northland Development company. The tract known as the Hoot Lakes Acres contain sites for 22 homes. The matter will come before the county board at a hearing Oct. 15.

The board approved insurance adjustments of \$7,868 for hail damage to roofs of school property on June 30. Fourteen policy holders are involved in the adjustment.

The Johns - Manville company has agreed to replace roofs on all sections of the new Roosevelt Park high school since the roofs installed originally have proved unsatisfactory. The board accepted the proposal under bond fulfillment.

The school board will be represented at a junior college hearing in St. Paul Oct. 22. A questionnaire considered last night will supply information to a state advisory committee.

The board approved a resolution for transfer of District 1494 north of Elizabeth from the Pelican Rapids district to Fergus Falls. The board entered into a contract with Dist. 1393 for the coming school year. Pupils from the district west of Fergus Falls will be transported to the Jefferson school.

Contracts were approved for three part time teachers. They are Mrs. Joyce Freye, senior high mathematics; Mrs. Joyce Youngren, senior high home economics, and Mrs. Ralph Barke who will teach one hour of French.

The state board of education has approved Cleveland and Eisenhower buildings as accredited elementary schools.
